We will be working with residents to agree the principles for redevelopment which will form part of a Supplementary Planning Document or SPD. document, developed through a wide consultation process, for final agreement by Gloucester City Council in 2018. Once in place, this type of SPD provides a 'blueprint' for how the area will continue to develop over the next 20 years or more. This is really important to ensure that Podsmead keeps pace with the city-wide renewal programme

and that it is fully connected with our wonderful historic city, so that existing and future communities are much better served.

This proposed SPD will be a local policy document for Podsmead that will form part of the emerging city-wide Local Plan for Gloucester. The Local Plan sets out how the local planning process needs to guide the city's programme of social, economic and environmental enhancement. Being involved in this process provides a real opportunity to shape your neighbourhood.

together, with GCH, the Council, local service providers, businesses and residents to look at the different factors that currently impact the estate. This will allow us to work out the real options that are available for the best possible redevelopment proposal for Podsmead.

The SPD will present the principles for a successful masterplan which is programmed

for completion in April 2018. It will then go out to formal public consultation with the aim of being adopted as part of local planning policy later in 2018.

Only after this has happened would the more detailed design work take place for a planning application to get approval for the redevelopment. This design work takes many months; typically over at least a year for projects of this size.

It's important that everyone is aware that this is a long process and your involvement along the way will make the proposals more successful and meaningful to Podsmead as a neighbourhood. We really look forward to meeting you and working with you to develop

In August and early September this year, residents were invited to take part in two 'walkabouts' led by community engagement consultants Kevin Murray Associates. Members of the community who came on each walkabout completed a feedback form based on the Place Standard tool to give us more information about what it's like living on

Moving Around Overall the estate is seen as easy to get around but some streets have poor paving making it difficult for mobility scooters. pushchairs and wheelchairs - some people don't use their mobility scooters for fear of them tipping over. Poor lighting, unsafe junctions and narrow roads with parked cars, e.g. next to shops, makes life harder for pedestrians.

Public Transport The No 10 service is considered to be a good, frequent service but Swanbrook is poor. All journeys go into the city centre but there are no direct routes to large supermarkets.

Traffic And Parking Lots of pavement parking. Traffic speeds are a concern and speed bumps are not effective. Crypt school traffic causes disruption in the morning and mid-afternoon during term times. Buses struggle to get by parked cars.

Streets And Spaces Better lighting would benefit some streets. public areas could have more seating.

Could make more of the greenspace, improving maintenance and tackling dog fouling. There is potential for underused land behind flats and houses in some areas to be better used as safe play areas for children from adjacent homes, for family barbecues, etc and to enhance wildlife.

Play And Recreation Need more facilities for young people; benches around play/ recreation areas for parents/ carers to sit on; outdoor cover for people like a 'bandstand' and a skate park for youngsters.

Community Some housing is reaching the end of its life; more family housing. Pre-fabs, especially refurbished ones are popular to purchase (cheaper than bungalows), good for older people moving into or back to the area.

Few places or opportunities to enjoy social contact, although the central area is a well-used space for events. Could do with a community centre for everyone.

Generally safe, pockets of 'amazing community' but also 'no go' areas after dark that are best avoided. Moped and motorbikes are a problem in central area after dark.

Has improved a lot over the years; ongoing problem with dog fouling. Recycling and refuse bin areas are unsightly, some even block ground floor windows. Grass-cutting of public spaces could be more frequent to avoid them looking unsightly/not cared

And Sense of Establishing a Residents' Panel would help this: current low trust in the local authority. General feeling is that community groups and voluntary organisations help interface with official support services.
